

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Introduction

NetShelter™ Soundproof Racks are high-quality, IT racks for storage of industry-standard (EIA/ECA-310), 19 in (483 mm) rack-mount hardware, including servers and voice, data, networking, and internetworking devices. Additionally, NetShelter Soundproof Racks offer a ventilated environment with Rack Power Distribution included in an attractive, wood finished rack.

This manual covers the general installation and customization of the NetShelter Soundproof Racks.

TIP/HEAVY EQUIPMENT HAZARD

- At least two people are required to move the rack.
- On 32U and 38U racks: For extra stability, load at least 158 kg (350 lb) into the bottom of the rack before moving the rack on its casters.
- When moving the rack on its casters, ensure the path of the rack is free of obstacles and debris.
- When moving the rack on its casters, make sure the leveling feet are in the fully raised position and push the rack from the front or rear. Never push the rack from the sides.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in death, serious injury or equipment damage.



A CAUTION

WEIGHT AND LEVERAGE HAZARD

- The leveling feet must be lowered before installing your components.
- Install the heaviest components toward the bottom of the rack to prevent the rack from becoming top-heavy.
- Doors and side panels are heavy. Removal or installation requires at least two people.
- Fan modules are heavy. Two people are recommended when removing the fan modules from the rack.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.

NOTICE

EQUIPMENT DAMAGE HAZARD

- To ensure adequate air movement, place the rear of the rack no closer than 200 mm (8 in) to the wall.
- Caster loads: The rack can be moved on its casters (the Dynamic Load) with up to 750 kg (1650 lb) of equipment installed. Once in place, lower the leveling feet. With the leveling feet lowered (the Static Load), the 32U and 38U static racks can be loaded with up to 1500 kg (3300 lb). The 12U and 17U static racks can be loaded with up to 840 kg (1848 lb).
- Use only the supplied power cord to power the fan module.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in equipment damage.


Labels

Safety and informational labels are affixed to the rack. Read and follow the instructions on the labels.

Tip Hazard and Weight limit labels are attached to the frame of the rack.

- 1. Observe Tip Hazards. Be sure to read all of the instructions for the rack.
- 2. Observe the load restrictions for the rack. The Dynamic load is limited to 750 kg (1650 lb). This is the maximum load for moving the rack on its casters.

The Static load is limited to 840 kg (1848 lb) for the 12U and 17U racks. The Static load for the 32U and 38U racks is limited to 1500 kg (3300 lb). This is the maximum load for the rack while resting on its leveling feet. Read the manual.








2. Hardware bag


Installation

Location Requirements

When planning the location for your NetShelter Soundproof Rack, make sure you have enough room to leave at least

203 mm (8 in) of space between the back of the rack and the wall so that proper ventilation can occur.

The final location for your rack should include sufficient space to perform everyday tasks and occasional maintenance.



Move the Rack




WARNING

TIP/HEAVY EQUIPMENT HAZARD

- At least two people are required to move the 32U and 38U racks.
- For greater stability, when moving 32U and 38U racks on their casters, load at least 159 kg (350 lb) in the bottom of the rack before moving the rack on its casters.
- Ensure the path of the rack is free of obstacles and debris.
- When moving the rack on its casters, make sure the leveling feet are in the fully raised position and push the rack from the front or rear. Never push the rack from the sides.
- Do not move a loaded rack on its casters if the weight exceeds the Maximum Dynamic Load of 750 kg (1650 lb).
- Do not overload the rack. Observe the Maximum Static Weight labels on your rack.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in death, serious injury or equipment damage.

Note the dimensions of any doorways or hallways in your path to reach the final location for your rack. Ensure you have enough space to move the rack through doorways or other obstacles.




Level the Rack


NOTICE

Leveling feet provide a stable base if the floor is uneven but, cannot compensate for a badly sloped surface.

Tools Required (not provided)



When the rack is in its final location, lower the leveling feet. Use a 19-mm, open-ended wrench (not provided) to lower the leveling feet. Use a level (not provided) to ensure the rack is level and plumb while lowering the leveling feet.



Ground the Rack

The NetShelter Soundproof Rack does not include a common grounding point. A common ground using a discrete bonding jumper must be connected directly to the rack. Follow all local and national codes.

Configuration

Before installing the rack, plan the location and space needed to install your equipment.

Front Doors

The doors may be opened or removed to access the interior. Removing a door or side panel can make it easier to install your equipment and route cables.


• The doors are heavy. Two people are recommended when removing the doors from the rack.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.


Hinges

Detach the hinges: The hinges on the doors can be detached in order to remove the doors. While at least one person is holding the door:

1. Loosen the retaining screw from the latch using a Phillips head screwdriver.




2. Lift the hinge arm off the mounting plate and slide the latch and door away from the mounting plate.



When all hinges have been detached from their mountings, the door can be removed.

To install the front doors you must attach the hinges. At least one person will be needed to hold the door in position while another person secures the hinges on the door to the mounting plates on the rack.

1. To attach the hinges, slide the hinge on the door into the mounting plate attached to the inside of the rack.



2. Tighten the retaining screw to secure the hinge to the mounting plate.

Rear Door






The rear door is heavy. Removal and installation of the rear door requires at least two people.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.


1. Open the rear door and disconnect the ground cable.



2. Disconnect the fan power cable from the DC power supply module.



3. The rear door has a spring-loaded pin securing the top of the door to the rack frame. The bottom of the door has a retaining pin which secures the bottom of the door to the rack frame. Pull down on the spring-loaded pin and tip the top of the door away from the rack. Lift the door up so the retaining pin can clear the rack frame.



Reverse the process to install the rear door.

Side Panels


Rear side panels can be removed for easier access during equipment installation. The larger forward side panels are accessed to allow for cable routing through the air flow chamber. The rear side panels allow access to the rack interior.

A CAUTION


WEIGHT AND LEVERAGE HAZARD

The side panels are heavy. At least two people are recommended when removing the side panels from the rack. Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.

1. Disconnect the ground wire from the side panel you want to remove. There is a ground wire on each side panel.



- 2. Unlock the side panel and tilt the panel out.
- 3. Lift the panel up and out of the channel in the rack frame.



Reverse the procedure to install the side panel.




Vertical 0U Accessory Channels

The vertical 0U accessory channels provide toolless mounting capabilities for Rack PDUs, cable containment brackets, and tie-off locations for cables.

There are two vertical 0U accessory channels located at the rear of the rack. One accessory channel is located on the hinge side of the rack facing the interior of the rack. The second accessory channel is located on the other side of the rack and faces the rear door. The accessory channels are secured using three (3) Phillips head screws and can be removed, if desired.





Vertical Mounting Flanges

Vertical mounting flanges come factory installed on the rack in the proper position for use with rack-mountable equipment having a depth of 736mm (29 in). The front and rear mounting flanges are adjustable to accommodate equipment with other depths.

The **Minimum** adjustment Is 691mm (27.20 in). The **Maximum** adjustment is 826mm (32.51 in) in 22.5mm (7/8 in) increments.

Adjust the vertical mounting flanges on the horizontal mounting rails



CAUTION


EQUIPMENT DAMAGE HAZARD

Any equipment installed to the vertical mounting flanges must be removed before attempting to move the vertical mounting flanges.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.


- 1. Phillips head screws and washers secure the front vertical mounting flange to the side of the rack. Use a Phillips head screwdriver (not provided) to remove two (2) Phillips head screws and washers on 12U and 17U racks and four (4) Phillips head screws and washers on 32U and 38U racks.
- 2. The front and rear vertical mounting flanges are secured to the horizontal mounting rails at the top and bottom by bolts and washers. Use a socket wrench and 13mm socket (not provided) to remove the bolts.
- 3. Reposition the vertical mounting flange to your chosen position and install the hardware.




Cable Management

The rack has a cable access opening 350mm (13.78 in) x 250mm (9.84 in) on the rear of the rack floor. The cable opening has a cover made from the insulating liner material to help secure the cables while preventing the entry of dust and debris.



Cable managers are attached to the frame of the brush strips at the front of the rack. Cables can be routed through the air flow chambers behind the brush strips. Cables can exit the air flow chambers through the openings at the rear (interior) of the rack.




Equipment Installation

NOTE: NetShelter Soundproof Racks are intended for use with Listed equipment. If you install un-Listed equipment, you should evaluate the safety of your configuration.

Cage Nuts

Proper location in the rack for cage nuts:

- 1. Locate the top and bottom U-space on the vertical mounting rails. Every third hole on the mounting rails is numbered to indicate the middle of a U-Space
- 2. Install the cage nuts on the interior of the vertical mounting rail; then install the shelf or equipment.





CAUTION


FALLING EQUIPMENT HAZARD

Do NOT install cage nuts vertically with the tabs engaging the top and bottom of the square hole.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.


Install cage nuts horizontally, with the tabs engaging the sides of the square hole.

Install the cage nuts on the interior of the vertical mounting rail.



To install a cage nut:

- 1. The cage nut is installed from the inside of the mounting rail.
- 2. Hook one tab of the cage nut assembly through the square hole.
- 3. Pull the cage nut toward the side of the rail that the tab is already through to squeeze it and push the other tab through the hole.
- 4. The cage nut will snap into position.



To remove a cage nut:

- 1. Remove any attached screw.
- 2. Squeeze the tabs on the sides if the cage nut and push to release it from the square hole.





Equipment Distribution in the Rack


Follow the guidelines below for proper installation and operation of your equipment in the NetShelter Soundproof Rack.

Avoid clustering hot-running equipment such as servers, dense redundant arrays of independent disks (RAID), and large voice-over-internet-protocol (VOIP) switches in one part of the rack.

Instead, distribute the thermal load evenly up and down the rack such that each fan module supports an equal amount of the thermal load.

Each fan module protrudes into the rack. This does not create an issue for the installation of most equipment.

To allow for ample cable space to the rear of the rack, deep servers should be installed in the rack space above and below the fans.




Internal Dimensions

The fan module creates a triangular protrusion which reduces the internal depth of the rack at that point.

The depth of your equipment should be considered to ensure room for cables and for adequate air circulation.

Deep servers should be installed above or below the fan modules.

- A 770mm (30.31 in)
- B 789.5mm (29.29)
- C 893mm (35.15)
- D 1042mm (41.0 in)




Accessories

Accessories for your NetShelter Soundproof rack can be ordered on the APC website, www.apc.com.

Blanking Panels

Blanking panels are intended to assist in the management of airflow within the rack. Use the provided blanking panels to close up any large open spaces in the rack. The NetShelter Soundproof rack works best when air can travel through the equipment vents and above and below any equipment that generates thermal energy.

Plastic Airflow Management Blanking Panels snap into place without the use of tools.



Maintenance

Fan Modules

A A DANGER

The power cable for the fan module is plugged into the installed Rack PDU. Disconnect the power cable from the Rack PDU and from the fan module before attempting to remove or perform any service on the fan module.

Failure to follow these instructions will result in death or serious injury.

PINCH HAZARD

Power cables must be secured to avoid pinching when the door is closed.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.



CAUTION

WEIGHT AND LEVERAGE HAZARD

At least two people are recommended when removing the fan modules from the rack.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.


Safety Labels

Observe the Safety Labels on the fan modules.




Reset button

The DC power supply for the fan module contains a reset button. Erratic mains power in some areas may cause the fuse in the DC power supply to trip. Should your power issues cause the fans to stop, press the reset button to restart the fans.



Fan Module Configuration


32U and **38U** Racks include multiple fan modules: There are two (2) fan modules on the rear door of the 32U rack and three (3) fan modules on the rear door of the 38U racks. Depending upon your model's configuration, there may be only one power supply for all the fan modules. The additional fan modules may have a connector box to bring power from the power supply. Fan modules on the rear door of a 32U rack are shown below.





Remove the Fan Module


- 1. Open the rear door to access the fan modules.
- 2. Unplug the power cable from the Rack PDU and then disconnect the power cable from the fan module power supply.




3. If your NetShelter Soundproof Rack includes more than one fan module, and the additional fan modules include connector boxes, you will need to disconnect the cable connecting the fan module power supply to the connector boxes. On the underside of the power supply, loosen the two (2) screws on the cable connection with a small flat tip screwdriver (not provided) and pull the connector from the socket on the power supply.



4. If you are removing a fan module with a connector box: Disconnect the cable to the connector box on the fan module. You will need to loosen the two (2) screws on the cable connector with a small flat tip screwdriver (not provided) and pull the connector from the socket on the connection box.



4. Remove the ten (10) Phillips head screws securing the fan module to the door.



Reverse the procedure to install the fan module.



Power cords must be secured to avoid pinching when the door is closed.

Failure to follow these instructions can result in injury or equipment damage.

Disconnect the power cord from the Rack PDU before disconnecting the cord from the fan power supply.



Thermostat

At some point, the thermostat may need to be replaced. Use care when performing this task. Replacement thermostats are available on the APC website. Go to **www.apc.com/support**.

A A DANGER

HAZARD OF ELECTRIC SHOCK, EXPLOSION, OR ARC FLASH


Disconnect the power cord from the Rack PDU and from the fan module power supply before attempting to replace the thermostat.

Failure to follow these instructions will result in death or serious injury.

The thermostat is located on the fan module next to the power supply.

If the thermostat must be replaced:

- 1. Disconnect the power cord from the Rack PDU and the fan power supply.
- 2. Pull the connector wire from the power supply and unplug the thermostat from the fan module.



3. Reverse the steps to install a replacement thermostat.
